Public Policy Updates By Mary Kay Melton



When States Fail at Political Equity, Women Students Step Up (Nov. 3, 2015)

Election season is officially here, and if you're anything like us, you've been reading a lot about <u>Carly Fiorina</u> and <u>Hillary Clinton</u>. Will one of them break the ultimate glass ceiling and win the presidency? Sadly, even if that does happen, women will still have a long way to go toward being equally represented at all levels of government.

Women make up just 19 percent of the 114th Congress, and only five of those women hold leadership or committee chair roles.

To change this, more women need to start running for office, and they need to start running earlier to build more influence over the course of their careers.

Elect Her

That is why <u>AAUW</u> and <u>Running Start</u> are bringing Elect Her workshops to 50 campuses in 2016. These workshops encourage and prepare college women to run for student government, giving them a head start into public office. After all, <u>56 percent of congresswomen got their start in student government!</u>

We will be training college women in 29 states plus the District of Columbia and Jamaica. This geographic range is crucial, considering three states have never sent a woman to the U.S. House **or** the U.S. Senate. **Delaware, Mississippi, and Vermont**, we're looking at you.

Luckily, Elect Her will be inspiring future Mississippi leaders at the Mississippi University for Women this year. It will be the first Elect Her workshop held in the state.

South Carolina isn't doing so hot when it comes to women in politics, either. In fact, it is ranked 47th in the country for percentage of women in the state legislature. I mean, really?

Students at the <u>College of Charleston</u> aren't going to accept this inequality. They are bringing Elect Her to their campus to train the next South Carolina state representatives!

Did you know that Maine is the only state never to elect a woman to statewide executive office? The state's only such office is governor, and, shockingly, the state has never elected a woman to that seat.

But the Elect Her team at the <u>University of Maine</u> is building a network of Elect Her alumnae who are ready to lead in the state. The university hosts students from across the state at their Elect Her workshop. We have no doubt in our minds that they've got this handled!

Elect Her prepares college women to run and win in both <u>student government</u> and <u>local elections</u>. Watch out for the women at <u>our 2015–16 Elect Her campuses</u>, who will change the face of politics from their campus communities to their country as a whole.

Hats Off to AAUW Funds for Helping Women Reach their Goals By Carol Mintz

The AAUW northern California 2015, luncheon was held on October 25th in Danville CA. I was fortunate to attend the gathering and so impressed by meeting and listening to a few of the women who have been awarded Fellowships and Grants.

During the year, 2015-16 there are over 25 AAUW Fund Fellowship and Grant recipients studying in colleges and universities or doing projects in our communities. These women are studying a wide range of topics such as:

- ...English Literature
- ...Electrical Engineering
- ...Chemistry

- ... Applied Mathematics
- ...Literature and Philosophy



In additional several career development grants have been awarded to students in the areas of:

- ...Graphic Design
- ...Nursing Anesthesia
-Civil Engineering
- ...Higher Education

Many of these students spoke about how grateful they were to receive the financial support and related how it had enriched their lives and their professions.

Because of the contribution of members, national AAUW was able to award \$3.7 million dollars to 241 Fellowship and Grant recipients in our country.

Members and branches in California contributed \$509, 701.08 to the various programs under AAUW Funds.

Non-Traditional Employment for Women (NEW) Event Held at Sierra College November 6, 2015

Lynda Braun, Kate Scott, Linda West, and Sandra Barnikel represented AAUW-RSP at the Non-traditional Employment for Women (NEW) event at Sierra College on November 6th, 9 AM – 2PM. All four spoke about their careers and answered questions at several tables while the girls ate their lunches. Over 100 local high school girls attended.

The keynote speaker was Gina Lujan, founder and CEO of Hacker Lab (now in Rocklin!), and 3 other women in non-traditional careers. Kate Scott and Lynda Braun also toured the 8 hands-on labs offered to the girls.

Some examples of the labs: they soldered metal butterfly sculptures; made small, heart-shaped plastic gift boxes using a 3-D printer; took photos & used computer programs to make ads for posting on a website; and made keychain flashlights in the mechatronics lab.
