Hear nationally acclaimed journalist **Michelle Carter** talk about her experiences in Russia during the "Bubble of Freedom" in the 1990's, the pre-Putin era. *From Under the Russian Snow* is a searing personal memoir of her year in Russia as a U.S. appointed Journalist-in-Residence when she attempted to "midwife" Russian journalists through the birth of a free press after the fall of the Soviet Union, working her way across 11 time zones in some of Russia's more primitive sectors.

Michelle was our speaker for the first Kick-Off program in 2011, when she told of her experience in a male dominated profession and her hopes of writing this memoir. She is also:

- * Co-author of the 1993 publication *Children of Chernobyl: Raising Hope From the Ashes* and chair of The Children of Chernobyl Project of Northern California, which raised over \$500,000 worth of chemotherapy drugs and two tons of medical supplies for hospitals in Belarus, Minsk.
- * A 19th California Assembly District Woman of the Year.
- * Former staff member and then managing editor of the San Mateo Times.
- * Retired Professor of Journalism at Notre Dame de Namur college in Belmont
- * An AAUW Member of the San Carlos Branch.

Michelle's book can be pre-ordered in paperback from Amazon or Barnes and Noble but will also be available for purchase at the Kick-Off. Guests will have an opportunity to ask the author questions and have books signed at the Kick-Off.

AAUW Lobby Day, National Convention in DC for 4 days by 6 branch members

Our Roseville South-Placer Branch was well represented at national convention June 14-17 in Washington, D.C., by (in last name alpha order) Kathleen Crawford, Lora Finnegan, Carolyn Garfein, Kathy Kort, Sue Miller, and Kathy Novotny. This group included the branch outgoing President, the branch incoming President, two past Presidents of the branch, a state board leader, and a former national President. We were certainly a powerful group, deeply committed to the values and mission of AAUW.

Welcome to National Convention

This opportunity gave us memorable speakers (see next paragraph), workshops, national board elections, and the first exposure to our new Chief Executive Officer, Kimberly Churches, as well as Lobby Day on Capitol Hill. In our briefing for Lobby Day, we reviewed the AAUW Public Policy positions and the new research study "Deeper in Debt, Women and Student Loans." Our CA delegation met with staff members for Senators Dianne Feinstein and Kamala Harris in the Hart Senate Lobby. Both Senators have a 100% voting record on voting for AAUW legislative recommendations and proposals. Our branch members Sue Miller (co-chair of the CA AAUW Public Policy Committee) and Kathleen Crawford presented the specific requests "asks" for legislative support on issues regarding Title IX and Student Loan Debt to both Senators' staff members who were very receptive and supportive. In the afternoon, the CA delegation split into smaller groups to meet with their congressional representatives. Our branch members were joined by a Mariposa branch member, also represented by Congressman McClintock with a 22% record of supporting AAUW legislative issues. His staff member was non-committal on the likelihood of his support for our position on funding the Office of Civil Rights (Title IX enforcement) and proposals to increase Pell Grant funding to lower the need for such extensive student debt or refinancing student loan debt to allow for easier repayment of the principal loan.

The highlights of the convention included Judy Woodruff (PBS Newshour anchor) who spoke on Wednesday evening, the day after the shooting of Congressman Scalise. Seeing and experiencing the security measures all over Capitol Hill drove home the gravity of the situation. Friday evening featured two incredible speakers: Dr. Tererai Trent and Supreme Court Justice Sonya Sotomayor. Dr. Trent was the Alumnae Recognition Awardee as a scholar, humanitarian, educator and a 2001-2 AAUW International Fellow from Zimbabwe. Her personal life story is compelling, and coming from an oral African tradition, she is an incredible story teller. She is the author of "The girl who buried her dreams in a can," a story of hope and perseverance.

Secret Service Security around Supreme Court Justice Sotomayor was on high alert, but Justice Sotomayor continued her interview while walking around the large convention banquet hall getting up close and personal with every table. She did warn the audience to "make no sudden moves." Her interview was conducted by Executive Director Kimberly Churches following her from table to table as Justice Sotomayer answered all the questions on her career, her interests, and the collegiality of the Supreme Court, while holding strong divergent opinions based in the law and constitution. Our members all considered Friday evening to be the highlight of the convention. Be certain to ask any of us about our impressions.

The national board elections resulted in Julia T. Brown to lead our organization as National Board Chair. The proposed by-laws change to eliminate the degree requirement was once again defeated. The business session informed us of the financial issues facing our organization and the announcement that the next national convention is being postponed to 2020 (rather than 2019) to coincide with and celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Woman's Right to Vote. The recently hired CEO Kimberly Churches spoke of her career experience (most recently with the Brookings Institute) and her personal affinity for the AAUW mission, values, and goals as a working woman and the mother of a young daughter.

The plenary session speakers and workshops provided fuel for thought and action. For instance, Linda DiVall (Executive Officer of American Viewpoint, a political consultant) advised that there are over 50 specific subtypes of female voters! The convention started early in the day and extended into the evening, allowing little time for exploring D.C.—although individually each of us managed a little time for our bucket list, i.e., the WWII memorial, the Newseum or dinner in Georgetown. Our time at convention strengthened our commitment to AAUW on both the macro and micro levels of national, state and our branch. Attending with 800 like-minded women from every corner of our country was affirming and inspiring. As soon as plans are announced for the 2020 national convention, plan to join our delegation!

Area girls win AAUW-RSP scholarships By Lora Finnegan, High School Scholarships Chair

Five South Placer County high school students won scholarships given by our branch this year. At awards assemblies held recently at Lincoln, Roseville, Oakmont, and Antelope high schools, five graduating girls were each given the \$500 AAUW-RSP scholarship. The winners are: Alla Klimkiv and Yazim Renteria-Sanchez of Antelope High School, Sandra Ines Diaz of Lincoln High School, Rylee Primavera of Oakmont High School, and Iulia Tarasova of Roseville High School.

Says AAUW-RSP President Kathleen Crawford, "This is our second year sponsoring scholarships for graduating female high school seniors in the South Placer community. Our AAUW members strongly support educational opportunities, and we recognize the need to do more in our area to support such deserving and qualified young women to become our future leaders."

In making the selections, High School Scholarship Chair Lora Finnegan was assisted by committee members Nancy Chapman, Jackie Lamb, Patricia Lane, and Cleo Postle; committee members had roughly 50 applications from six area schools to judge.

To be considered for the award, each applicant had to submit an essay and three letters of recommendation, have a GPA of at least 2.5 or higher, and have a college admission letter. In addition, criteria considered includes financial need, community or work experience, and school activities.
