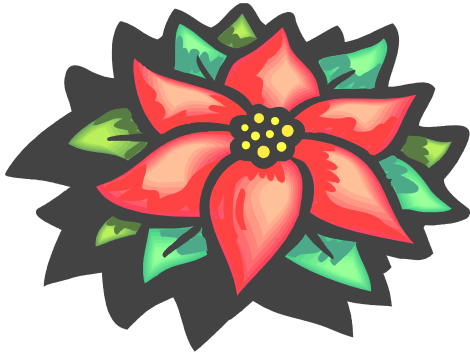

Our Speaker: From Compassion Planet—Helping Young People in Need

Hear Scott Flanagan, Executive Director of South Placer's Compassion Planet, describe their unique program to assist the area's aged-out foster youth (ages 18+) and teens at risk. Compassion Planet helps those underserved young people who are turned out of the foster care programs at age 18. It provides training programs and demonstrates how one's whole life can affect his or her vocation. It addresses such needs as hunger, clothing, housing, life skills, mentoring, and employment within a family-like structure.

Mr. Flanagan will describe South Placer's Deer Creek Farm and Thrift Store that helps provide funding for this program and Compassion Planet's connection to other area services to aid these very needy young people.

How can you help? Compassion Planet currently trains and assists eight aged-out foster youth. Clothing: cards for The Galleria, Target, Walmart, Macy's, Burlington Coat Factory, etc.

Food: cards for local eateries, coffee shops, bakeries, etc.

Items for daily living in an apartment: could be purchased at some of the stores above.

Gift cards (unwrapped) can be purchased in local grocery stores to make getting them easier.

Even some home made gift bags of cookies would cheer them up for the holidays.

Sierra College Leadership News By Lynda Braun



The Leadership Committee hosted an information table on the Sierra College Quad October 20th, during their Social Justice Days. The purpose was to inform students and faculty about the programs offered by AAUW advancing social justice for women and to offer free student e-affiliate memberships in AAUW. This added to the more than 30 students who were signed up in September.

Sierra College will be one of 50 colleges nationwide to host an AAUW Elect Her workshop on the Sierra College Campus in the Spring of 2016. Campus administrators, students, and local AAUW members collaborate with AAUW and Running Start staff to plan the training sessions. The 4.5 hour workshop encourages and trains women to run for student government and future political office. Participants practice hands-on campaign skills, hear from inspiring local speakers, and discuss research on women in government. 76 percent of the 2015 Elect Her participants who reported running for student office WON!

Public Policy Updates By Mary Kay Melton

Very Good News---From AAUW Washington Update:



California became the state with the [strongest equal pay protections](#) in the nation last month after **Governor Jerry Brown signed the California Fair Pay Act**. The new law requires employers to pay workers equally for “substantially similar work” even if their titles or work sites are different. The law will also close loopholes that have made it difficult for employees to successfully sue over discriminatory pay. Employers will now be prohibited from retaliating against employees who discuss or ask about co-workers’ wages.

The Department of Labor Women’s Bureau awarded [\\$1.55 million in grants](#) to study the development and implementation of paid leave programs across the country. Eight states—California, Maryland, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Vermont, and Washington—received grants to analyze various models to determine how policies such as paid family leave can help fight income inequality.

The Supreme Court reconvened last month for its 2015-16 term. Here are some of the cases it will consider:

The affirmative action case: Fisher v. University of Texas could further restrict the use of race in college admissions decisions. Affirmative action programs establish equal opportunity for women and minorities and improve gender, racial, and ethnic diversity in educational institutions and in workplaces.

The voting rights case: Evenwel v. Abbott will consider whether voting districts should be established based on total population—as is currently the case—or eligible voters. Changing the current standard could shift voting power away from communities with large numbers of children and higher immigrant populations.

The union case: Friedrichs v. California Teachers Association has the potential to limit the ability of unions to collectively bargain. Unions are an important tool for all workers, but especially women, in fighting for fair pay, safe working conditions, health care, and retirement benefits.

The potential abortion regulations case: There will likely be a case challenging the restrictive abortion regulations put in place in Texas. Although couched as protecting the health and safety of women, these harmful restrictions both seek to and are succeeding in limiting access to safe, legal abortion and in so doing are also limiting access to women’s reproductive healthcare generally.

The potential birth control coverage case: It is probable that the Court will hear a case from religiously affiliated organizations seeking to challenge the Affordable Care Act’s preventive healthcare contraceptive coverage provision. They will claim that having to notify the federal government about their objections to birth control coverage in their insurance plans makes them complicit in facilitating access to contraceptives and therefore violates their religious freedom.

Governor Brown Signs SB 358—California Fair Pay Act By Sue Miller

Members of the *Stronger California* coalition, including AAUW CA, who have been actively lobbying legislation that could affect women economically, were invited to the signing of **SB 358, the Fair Pay Act**. Seldom does Governor Brown sign bills in such a public way, so this was quite a momentous event.

Held at the Rosie the Riveter National Monument in Richmond, invited guests included seven “Rosies”—all in their late 80’s and early 90’s and very articulate! They were paid wages equal to non-combat men doing the same work, even in the 1940’s! Many coalition members brought their children, who were invited to sit on the stage – after all, they can benefit from Fair Pay legislation in the future!

AAUW Roundtable with US Treasurer Rosie Rios New \$10 bill design

On Friday, October 9, I had the honor of joining 50 of my fellow AAUW members, the Board of Directors, and our CEO for an exclusive, behind-closed-doors roundtable session with **U.S. Treasurer Rosie Rios**, the "woman behind the woman on the \$10 bill." We had a very open and productive conversation about whose face should grace that new bill, as well on the persistent gender pay gap and other pertinent issues.

The decision, by Rios and U.S. Treasury Secretary Jack Lew, to make a woman the face of the \$10 bill has reignited two long-standing discussions that AAUW cares very much about: how to represent the key role that women play in our nation's history and how to empower women today.

As the 43rd treasurer of the United States, Rios is key ally in both those discussions. The timing of our meeting was also fitting: just under a week before Latina Equal Pay Day, the symbolic date each year that Latina women have to work to in order to be paid what a man was paid the previous year. Working 10 whole months extra just for the same pay - it's shameful!

A prominent Latina political figure, Rios shares our frustration about the pay gap and the still-unequal status of women in the United States. Her signature appears on roughly half the banknotes in this country. After our discussion, I know she shares our commitment to real change, not spare change - and to getting more of those signatures into the pockets of hardworking American women and their families!

AAUW has a long history of advocating for women's economic security and pay equity. It was an honor to be part of this chapter in that ongoing legacy.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the I.B.C. that branch members often hear about?

I.B.C. stands for Inter Branch Council, the group that represents the AAUW branches in this multi-county region of California: Auburn, Citrus Hts.-American River (CHAR), Davis, Foothills of El Dorado County, Nevada County, Roseville, Sacramento and Woodland. The I.B.C. serves as a conduit from the CA state AAUW board to local branches.



The council now meets quarterly and its purpose is to share ideas about what branches are doing, to offer one another advice and, primarily, to plan the yearly I.B.C. luncheon that raises money for AAUW Funds. The luncheon features an informative speaker, often from this region, who is being supported for graduate work by AAUW. The luncheon has been held in Roseville several times but in recent years has moved to Plates, a Sacramento non-profit run by St. John's Shelter that serves food while providing supportive services and trains homeless women for jobs in the restaurant business.

There are 2 officers in the I.B.C. (Coordinator and Secretary/Treasurer) and each member branch takes a rotation in serving as officers. The current Coordinator is Roseville South Placer member **Kathleen Crawford**, whose role is to convene the meetings, work with all member branches to arrange the annual luncheon in January at Plates and share with other branches what we are doing.

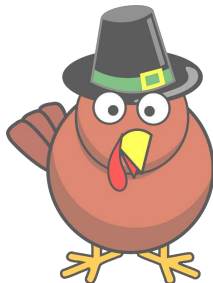

Branch Lines may be printed out in color or in black and white. Your printer will most likely be set for color. You may click on Properties or Preferences and change the setting to black and white or grayscale. It is suggested that you print out the newsletter now so you will have it handy for future reference.
