March Board Meeting Highlights

- The Non-Event Fundraiser has so far raised \$5,210 from 81 members.

Women of Distinction Event

During the last few months, a small group of the Philanthropy Committee has met to determine the feasibility of offering a "Women of Distinction" event as a fundraiser for our branch. After a lot of discussion and brainstorming, the committee decided that we would like to see our branch offer a first-class fundraising event that would honor and celebrate two or three outstanding women who have made significant contributions to their communities within South Placer County. The honorees would be chosen from the general population and may or may not include a branch member.

The committee discussed several ideas for the event, but it will be up to the Women of Distinction Committee to make final decisions. Several members have already expressed an interest in serving on the committee including Kathy Dorsey, Kathy Neuhaus, Sue Miller, Kathleen Crawford and Kathy Kort. The Women of Distinction Committee will fine tune the event concept. Committee members will decide on what type of event it will be (luncheon, dinner, etc.), will develop the program (choosing the master of ceremonies, securing a keynote speaker), develop the criteria to be used to select the women of distinction, as well as finding a venue, publicizing the event, etc. This is a big project and will need lots of volunteers to be successful. In approving the Women of Distinction concept, the board felt that there would be many advantages to offering such an event, including ultimately providing needed branch funds through just one major fundraiser a year, rather than several. Such an event would help us gain a greater presence in our community and would fulfill part of our AAUW mission.


Tech Trek Girls for 2015 By Connie Losk, Tech Trek Chair

Public Policy: Resources and Programs Affecting Our Lives By Kathleen Crawford: Public Policy & Leadership Development

April is Pay Equity month and recent statistics on the Gender Pay Gap are out. California ranks fifth in median earnings of women working full time compared with men's earnings in 2013 at 84%. Award for least pay gap goes to Washington DC at 91%, and the record for highest pay gap goes to Louisiana with 66%. The national average is 78%.



Considering the cost of living in California, the 6% difference between our somewhat higher rate and the national average is not encouraging. Here in Placer County, the rate is 78%, which is below the statewide California rate.

Pay equity for women is a complex issue. Recently on March 15, 2015, Dan Walters in his opinion article in the Sacramento Bee, stated:

"Census data places about 9 million Californians in poverty but it obviously extends further because more than 12 million are being enrolled in Medi-Cal, the state medical plan for the poor, approaching one third of the population. However, only 1.3 million Californians are receiving welfare benefits, telling us that most in poverty are in 'working poor' families."

This cuts across all sectors, as noted in the impassioned statement by actress Patricia Arquette at the Academy Awards. What would a significant increase in the minimum wage mean for working poor families? Working poor families are statistically likely to be single female parent households. What does this mean for us, our daughters, children, and grandchildren? It means lower retirement benefits (both social security and other pensions), lower standard of living, inability to financially support college costs for self-improvement or our children, less access to medical, dental, vision and psychiatric support and more stress in the daily life of making ends meet.

By supporting AAUW lobbying efforts, we can impact both state and national efforts to improve the situation for women, children and families both locally and nationwide. Take advantage of our women power and join in the advocacy efforts by signing up at advocacy@aauw.org for the Two Minute Activist and weekly emails on federal issues. Once you sign up on the national site, you are automatically registered for the CA State Alert messages.
