As my term as President winds to a close, I want to express my thanks to all of you who helped make this a successful year. I am so impressed with the members of this branch--you never fail to step up when you are needed. For example, we had over 80 members volunteer to help out with our Antique Answers fundraiser, and that doesn't count all the members who volunteered throughout the year on committees or to help with programs and other fundraisers!

Another example: For the Non-event this year, we raised nearly \$7,000 from that event alone with contributions from more than half of our members.

We've put in place a couple of new projects to help us raise money in the future. We've applied for some grants from foundations/corporations (see page 3 for further information). The details of the dinner and the awards are still being developed, but we will have more information to share with you at the Installation Luncheon on June 2. In any case, both of these projects represent a change in our thinking. Instead of turning inward to our members for everything, we're beginning to reach out to the larger community--tooting our own horn about all the good things we do for our community and asking them to join us.

We can feel proud of the programs that AAUW sponsors in our community. The Sierra College scholarship program and Tech Trek, in particular, have made significant differences in the lives of women and girls. This difference was brought home to me by the letter we received from a former Tech Trek girl outlining what a profound difference Tech Trek has made in her life (see page 7). Letters like these really inspire us to continue on with our volunteer work and our fundraising to ensure that we can continue to provide these opportunities for women and girls in South Placer County.


Sue Cofer reported on a movie, "Girl Rising," to be shown at the Rocklin Movie Studio Grill on May 18th. Former Tech Trekker, Hanna Shows, arranged to show the movie: a documentary which tells the story of 9 girls from different parts of the world who face arranged marriages, child slavery, and other injustices. Board members were encouraged to support Hanna's efforts by bringing friends to attend this movie.

To date, 50% of members have renewed their membership for the 2015-16 year. Calls will be made to remind and encourage members to renew. Six new members have joined the branch since April and will be among the new members who have joined since July of 2014 to a New Member Tea being planned for June.

March/April monthly financial reports were distributed and reviewed. All reimbursement requests should be submitted by June 15.

## Antique Answers and Other 2014-15 Philanthropy Events By Maria Actis, AAUW-RSP, Philanthropy Vice President

Our branch held its second successful Antique Answers Evaluation Day Fundraiser at the Valley Springs Presbyterian Church in Roseville on Saturday, May 2nd. This year the event drew approximately 96 people from the community, of which 68% were non-members. We had 11 appraisers that looked at over 290 antiques and provided verbal evaluations. The appraisers were Gary Cox, Barbara and Bob Velasco, Bob Hensley, Charles Gray and Lynne Holmberg-Gray, Brad Lomazzi, Debra & Jerry Jensen, Joy Zgola, Brian Johnson, Paulette Volz, Kathy Platt, and Malcolm Howe. The price charged was reasonable, and people actually went home and came back with more items.



Overall, the Philanthropy Committee for this fiscal year (2014-15) raised approximately **\$20,000** from contributions and the fundraising events. A major significant change in our fundraising process this year was the collaboration between Philanthropy and several of the "Interest Groups" as well as Program. For the wine event in November 2014, Philanthropy worked with the Wine Appreciation Group for a very successful wine-tasting day. Funds came in from the branch precinct work in November. Additionally, Philanthropy and Program teamed up to put on a successful Fashion Show in March 2015. This teamwork was phenomenal this year. Because of this teamwork and collaboration between the groups, our success was phenomenal this year. The Non-event brought in approximately **\$6,825**. Please note there are still four more weeks for those who have not contributed to the yearly Non-event fundraiser. (See how on page 10.)

Philanthropy put together a superlative Grant Writing Sub-committee this year and began writing requests for grant monies from various companies and organizations throughout greater Placer County. The branch received our first grant of \$5,000 from the Auburn Indian Community of the Auburn Rancheria. With this grant and the relentless hard work from the Philanthropy Committee on the fundraisers, we have exceeded our fundraising goal of \$15,350 this fiscal year. We will have the funds to meet our forecasted plans for the Sierra College Scholarships and Tech Trek for 2015-16.

I want to thank the Philanthropy Committee and all of our branch member volunteers who have supported us and who have truly made this possible, for without you, we **would not** have been successful. Congratulations! You worked hard together as a cohesive and collaborative team. I am proud to say that I have worked alongside all of you and that I have been part of such a successful team effort.

### Sierra College Students Attend AAUW Leadership Conference By Sue Miller, Sierra College Leadership Chair

A dynamic team of Sierra College students is headed to Washington DC May 29-31 to participate in **AAUW's National Collegiate Conference for Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL).**Sierra College is one of eleven colleges throughout the nation to receive a Campus Action Project grant from AAUW. The grant requires that the project results be presented at NCCWSL.

Under the leadership of **Professor Megan Seely**, a member of the Roseville-South Placer AAUW branch and chair of the Sierra College Sociology Department, the six-student grant team worked to create a gender stereotype visual project, addressing, challenging and raising awareness of gender notions and sexism. They created a Gender Alphabet, presented on 26 posters that were displayed on the Rocklin campus April 27-30. Each word was defined, with its improper use and bias noted on the poster. The girls staffed an information table near the project display, and initiated discussions with interested students and faculty. The project pointed out that gender bias, particularly as directed toward women, is often unconscious. The students' work was well thought out and professionally done!

**Professor Seely commented:** "The teamwork and camaraderie of this group has been exceptional! I have never had a group work together as well as these young women!"

These energetic girls decided that they'd all like to attend NCCWSL and set about fundraising — bake sales, car wash, selling T-shirts, soliciting donations through the Sierra College foundation. As a result, four girls will be traveling to the conference to present the project to over 1,000 attendees.

I have met these young women. Their enthusiasm, teamwork and creativity are most impressive! It makes me proud to be part of AAUW, supporting girls in ways that enable them to educate others about inequity as well as offer them opportunity for personal growth. **They are the future of AAUW!**

At our 2014 Fall Kickoff Meeting in September, former President of the National AAUW, Carolyn Garfein, addressed the group with the challenge that she would match the amount that members contributed through the end of October. As a result of Carolyn's generous gift, our members came forward with their monetary contributions for a grand total of \$3,950. Thank you so much to all of you, and especially to Carolyn Garfein.

During the past three fiscal quarters, our members contributed a total of **\$9,108**. The fourth quarter fiscal contributions will be received at the end of June.

One of the women who used the funds to further her post-graduate education is Michele Segar. Michele is now an associate director of the University of Michigan Sport, Health and Activity Research and Policy Center for Women and Girls and a behavior-change expert for notable sources like the "New York Times, Prevention, and Women's Health."

Another woman who has benefited from an AAUW Fellowship is Melissa Harris-Perry. Ms. Harris-Perry is a host of her own show on MSNBC. She is also a professor at Tulane University and a columnist for "The Nation."

On the international level, Esther Ngumbi has used her fellowship to become an entomologist and motivational speaker nominated for "One World Action's 100 Program." She is committed to work in Kenya and other African countries to develop sustainable farming and a science and leadership center.
