Eleanor Roosevelt Honorees--2014-2015 AAUW Year

Jackie Lamb

As a branch member for nearly five years, Jackie has served in a variety of ways: as President Elect, President, Vice President of Philanthropy, and as a committee member working on projects. As president in 2012-13 she initiated a pilot program that restructured the Board to improve its efficiency, adding two new positions: Vice Presidents of Philanthropy and Outreach. Jackie also worked for many months to finalize the Branch application to become a 501 (c) (3) non-profit. She hand-carried documents to the State departments in Sacramento and closely monitored the process by telephone to ensure its completion. She also gained the help of a volunteer accountant to advise the Branch.



Jackie next served as Vice President of Philanthropy and worked with her committee to plan and develop many successful fundraising activities, including the first Antique Evaluation Day. This project brought scores of residents from the community to have their antique objects evaluated.

This year as part of the Marketing/Publicity committee, Jackie took on a huge project working with Lincoln High School students who had received a grant to produce a media project. Jackie's work with the students and advisor resulted in the first-ever Branch video, shown at the installation. This video will be used to publicize the Branch in the greater South Placer and Sacramento County area and increase awareness of the Branch's goals and mission.

Jackie has also formed relationships with various community leaders such as the President of Sierra College, William Duncan, presenting him with information about the Branch's scholarship and leadership programs that help students at Sierra College. Since Jackie's presidency, with the help of other Branch leaders, the Branch's activities at Sierra College have increased greatly.

Jackie has contributed greatly to the Branch by her leadership and volunteering to take on projects and see them through to completion. Thank you for your great contributions to the Branch.

Patricia has been a Branch member since 2006 and over the years has given her time, effort and talent to many Branch activities, often using her skills from a background in marketing and research.

Sierra College News By Sue Miller, Sierra College Leadership Chair

Sierra College received an AAUW Campus Action Project Grant, and under the leadership of Professor Megan Seely, six students in her fall 2014 "Introduction to Women Studies" class developed "Gender Stereotypes A to Z". This project identified 26 stereotypes, connected them with inappropriate words, and asked appropriate questions to educate and stimulate thinking about the use of these words. Posters of these words were erected on the campus for 5 days in late April. As part of the grant, Professor Seely and one student were given scholarships to attend AAUW's National Collegiate Conference of Women Student Leaders in Washington in late May, 2015. 2015 AAUW National Convention in San Diego By Kathleen Crawford

1040 women (and men), including 5 from our branch, gathered in San Diego to participate in AAUW's 2015 National Convention. We chose from more than 30 workshops including sessions on programs, membership, public policy advocacy, marketing, and fundraising.

The opening Plenary Session panel took up the topic on federal enforcement in the areas of Human Trafficking, criminal enterprises and gangs as well as the At Risk Girls Commission in San Diego County. Bonnie DiManis from the San Diego County District Attorney office and Catherine Lhamon, Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights in the Department of Education spoke eloquently about the importance of AAUW advocacy for these issues. In the area of Leadership Development, the soon to be released program Work Smart was previewed as a pilot project for increasing the negotiating skills of working women to begin to narrow the wage gap. The workshop on "What it Takes to Make a Woman Leader" motivated us to come home and take action. We heard about the barriers as well as successes for Women in Technology and got updates on AAUW programs: Tech Trek, \$tart \$mart, and Elect Her.

The 2015 Eleanor Roosevelt Fund Awardee Juanita Johnson-Bailey closed out the convention with her career experiences in the Georgia Office of Mental Health and her current position as Director of the Institute for Women's Studies at the University of Georgia. Her specialty is race and gender research in educational and workplace settings. She commented on the distancing of higher education away from personal interaction with students and professors with the increasing marketing efforts of higher education to specific audiences. Early family influences determine gender roles that most often start in the family. She emphasized the benefits of coalitions.

We were inspired by the enthusiasm and comradeship of AAUW members from around the country. Our branch was honored as one of the top 50 branches nationwide in contributions to AAUW funds, thanks to the generosity of the matching grant offered by Carolyn Garfein at the 2014 Membership Kick Off! (See Sanchia in picture below pointing to our branch as one of the top 50!)

Learning + Fun = Tech Trek Camp 2015 By Kim Lillard, Tech Trek Chair


Since 1998, AAUW has helped change girls' lives through Tech Trek, an experiential, week-long summer camp held at UC Davis, designed to further the interest and passions of 8th grade girls in STEM: Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. This year AAUW Roseville-South Placer Branch sent five middle schoolers to camp: Elena Castro (Twelve Bridges), Lauren Gray (Buljan), Maya Snow (Cavitt), Raquel Thomas (Buljan), and Mridini Vijay (Granite Oaks).

During their week at UC Davis, the five young women who received this year's scholarship have participated in hands-on classes in math and science, as well as field trips, craft projects and physical education. Classes at this year's camp included Chemistry, Forensics, Entomology, Audio Engineering, Anatomy, App Design, Genetics, and 3-D Math as part of Civil Engineering. Teachers, professionals and visiting experts in STEM fields shared their knowledge with the girls, bringing practical experience to the skills the girls gained throughout their camp week.

This summer the girls learned that the UC Davis campus is home to the largest collection of insects in the United States. They created an alarm system they could take home and put on their bedroom doors to keep out pesky siblings. They received real-world experience while waiting for their architectural drawings to go through "government plan check." Perhaps most importantly, they learned that science involves asking serious ethical questions as well as looking for pure scientific answers.

Several of our campers plan to serve as future junior camp counselors if their schedules allow; all of them said the camp fueled their desire to attain degrees in the STEM fields. AAUW members are needed to support this wonderful program and to do the important work of equipping young women for STEM fields by serving on this committee. Reaching out to schools and encouraging young girls to apply and go through the scholarship process to become the next group of campers is crucial to the success of Tech Trek.

AAUW members who serve on the committee have the inside track when it comes to reading the essays the girls prepare, interviewing the girls to find out how STEM fields fuel their passions for their futures, and discussing with the parents how to bring their daughters' dreams of a future in science, math and technology one step closer to reality. AAUW members get the happy task of attending the ice cream social for the Tech Trek finalists (and I can tell you from experience how many smiles
