With our theme SOAR in mind, the board is getting the year off to a good start. At the planning session in July we developed a "5 Areas of Focus" document which will be our guide for the year. A copy will be posted on the branch website, where you will find lots of information about what is happening in the branch, including the complete copies of approved minutes of board meetings. If you want to be informed, I encourage you to visit the website often.

Something new in *Branch Lines* will be the "Ask a question" column. In an effort to keep you better informed, we encourage you to ask a question. A response will follow in the next edition.



As part of reaching out to the community the Board will launch a High School Scholarship Program. Five \$500 scholarships will be awarded to deserving South Placer senior girls who will be attending college. The criteria for and implementation of the scholarships will be developed by an Ad Hoc committee. Stay tuned. This new project expands our scholarships for re-entry women to Sierra College and Tech Trek for middle school girls. The board will continue to explore new ideas as we seek to fulfill our mission and vision:

Mission Statement: AAUW advances equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research.

Vision Statement: AAUW empowers all women and girls to reach their highest potential.

Highlights of August 12, 2015 Board Meeting

The branch budget for 2015-16 was unanimously approved. New philanthropic projects include: funding for five high school scholarships, an additional Sierra College Women's re-entry scholarship and scholarship funding for National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL).

Additionally, there is an increase in the contribution to AAUW FUNDS. These philanthropic contributions are a direct result of the increase in fundraising for the last few years and our success with the branch 501c3 status.

The President will appoint an Ad Hoc committee to work on criteria and implementation of the new high school scholarship program with a goal to award the high school scholarships in the spring of 2016.

Committee reports from Program, Membership, Philanthropy, Communications and Policies & Procedures were given.

During the last school year The Marketing Committee worked with Lincoln High School Advance Video Production class to create a video that tells the story of AAUW and specifically about our Branch.

Featured in the video is the President of Sierra College discussing all the activities sponsored by the Roseville South Placer Branch on the campus. Past scholarship recipients and a Tech Trek girl also discuss the wonderful support they received from our Branch.

The teacher, Matt Tofft, said "It's the first all-student produced video we've done and the students learned a lot about the technical aspects, but also about the real life side of the business." Students were surprised when their first efforts were evaluated by the Marketing Committee and learned that more work was needed.

The collaboration between high school students and senior citizens also allowed for exchanges between generations in which both sides learned something new. Many of the issues raised in the video, such as Pay Check Fairness, were news to the young students.

The video will now allow the Branch to make presentations to Businesses and other groups, showing the work we do. Most importantly the story is told by those we have helped and not by the AAUW members. It is our hope to generate a greater awareness of our Branch philanthropy throughout South Placer.

Since Tech Trek, Hannah has been involved in women's leadership programs such as Girl's Leadership Worldwide (GLW) and founded a branch of the United Nations' program 'Girl Up' at Rocklin High. 'Girl Up' is an organization dedicated to education and fundraising to support girls' education in third world countries. It empowers women to incite change in their communities.

In May, Hannah secured the license and coordinated all the details necessary for a showing of 'Girl Rising' at the Movie Studio Grill theater. This film is the story of 9 young women in third world countries who fought for their peers to be able to have an education, knowing that education is the way to change for a better future. Numerous members of the AAUW RSP Branch attended the showing, coming away in awe at what young women around the world are doing to better their futures. Through Hannah's efforts, \$1200 was raised to further the mission of 'Girl Up'... to empower young women in education and leadership roles.

Public Policy Updates By Mary Kay Melton

Latest from AAUW Washington Update:

In July, the Senate passed Every Child Achieves Act (S. 1177) which includes many AAUW-supported provisions, but still needs improvements to hold schools accountable for improving academic results for all students. We applaud the inclusion of important gender equity provisions and are pleased that the bill will take strides to ensure all students receive a strong K-12 education. However, it is unacceptable that states face no consequences for failing to meet these standards or address achievement gaps.

As the bill moves forward, it is critical that the conferees add provisions that hold schools accountable for improving academic results for all students and closing achievement gaps before the bill is presented to the president for his signature.



Important gender equity amendments were also included such as Sen. Richard Blumenthal's (D-CT) amendment to fund state work on Title IX enforcement, Sen. Patty Murray's (D-WA) amendment to provide public data on high school athletic program expenditures for girls and boys, Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand's (D-NY) amendment to provide STEM programs for girls and minority students, Sen. Tom Udall's (D-NM) amendment to support pregnant and parenting students, and Sen. Elizabeth Warren's (D-MA) data transparency amendment to ensure all girls and boys are represented.

AAUW looks forward to continuing to work with Congress to improve the Every Child Achieves Act and public K-12 education for all.

From AAUW Action Network:

On August 6, 2015, our nation marked the fiftieth anniversary of the Voting Rights Act, which intended to protect millions of Americans from discriminatory voting restrictions. Fast forward 50 years later and we continue to see voting practices that directly affect women, minorities, young voters, and the elderly from accessing the ballot box.

Why is this happening? The 2013 Supreme Court decision in Shelby v. Holder gutted the heart of the Voting Rights Act by striking down the law's preclearance provisions.

That's why Congress must act to restore voter protections that would require key states that have demonstrated a history of voting discrimination to obtain preclearance prior to any voting changes.

The right to vote is exactly that – a right. The Supreme Court's 2013 decision has made it harder for millions of women, college students, minorities, the poor, and the elderly to vote; it is long past time for Congress to fix this decision.


