April Program Celebrates Women and Girls Are Women Getting Their Piece of the Pie?

With pie as a metaphor for women seeking their equal roles in education and the work force, Sue Cofer opened the April program held at the Womans Club in Lincoln, first explaining the formative construction of a pie with its many possibilities and the ways each step of the process can be like a woman's role in life.

Betty Manning, Scholarship Chair, described the selection process for the Sierra College Returning Women in Education scholarship and then introduced one of this year's scholarship recipients, Pham, who spoke without notes about her journey from Vietnam to California and her struggle for education while supporting her children. Pham has continued to learn English as a Second Language while maintaining A grades at Sierra College in accounting, her chosen career.

Lora Finnegan, High School Scholarship Chair, described the Branch's process for selecting girls who need financial aid to go on to college. The Branch will send seven girls to continue their education with \$500 scholarships each. While no current students could attend the program because of school, some of last year's winners' letters were read by Lora. The need in this Placer County area is great, and the girls are grateful for all financial aid they can get.

Alecia Hetman, the final speaker for the day, gave a spirited presentation about the history of Title IX and where matters stand today regarding equality for girls in education. The Branch has heard Alecia speak before in her various roles as both California and National Board member, but no one had heard her speak so passionately as she did at the April program. She currently serves on the State Title IX committee and displayed a number of visual aids and handouts showing the still-disgraceful treatment of girls in California's school programs.

The nearly forty members who attended enjoyed actual pie, brought by Vice President Sue Cofer, and had a chance to talk with the speakers afterward.

Sierra College Scholarships

On Wednesday, April 4th, the Scholarship Committee had the pleasure of interviewing 6 Sierra College students for our 3 scholarships. The Committee members interviewing were: Louise Santana, Jean Ching, Pat Tolleson and Betty Manning. As we've found in the past, many of Sierra College's students are truly impressive for what they've survived in the past and how they're approaching their future....our newest students are no exception! The women we chose made it easy, since these 3 re-entry students truly stood out for their intelligence, enthusiasm, motivation, compassion and work ethic! We'd like to introduce you to them.

Jennifer Stuck is a single mother of three young daughters. She says: "In my life, I've already witnessed a massive shift in the way women are treated in education. I grew up being told women aren't supposed to be good at math and science. Now, I am a STEM major with a focus on Sustainable Agriculture and Environmental Science. I can't wait to set a better example for the next generation! To extend my education outside of the classroom, I volunteer with the Sacramento Tree Foundation and Roseville Urban Forest Foundation. It is my goal to continue my education with a 4-year degree at UC Davis, then work with one of these foundations to lead habitat restoration projects in my community." The committee wasn't sure how she finds time for all she does, but it was obvious in her interview that she's discovered a passion for the environment and will make a difference in the future of environmental sustainability!



Elisa Ballard is a widowed mother of 3 children, an 8-year-old and 2 teenagers, who works full time and goes to school full time. She spoke about how she has to budget everything from time to money. She often works until closing at her job at McDonalds, then has to drop her kids off at school before she can go to school herself. She is obviously an extraordinary example of how to "budget," which is good, since she plans to get her MBA and CPA in the future and has set definite goals to do so! We feel that Elisa is an outstanding example of an immigrant who has worked to learn English and attend school in an English-speaking environment to make a future for herself and her children! We were totally inspired by this positive and hard-working woman!



Kailia Mize is a mother of five sons, of whom three are now adults; plus she has a 16-year-old son with autism and a 12-year-old son with Melanocytic Nevus. Her youngest son has undergone 30 surgeries and has another scheduled this year. Kailia said in her interview that she's found that laughter is often the best tool when life becomes stressful (so laughter is "the best medicine!")—and she's passed her philosophy on to her boys. Kailia is also a Licensed Vocational Nurse and is passionately committed to changing how the current healthcare system handles the care of our elderly. With that goal in mind, she is pursuing her Associate's degree at Sierra College in hopes of transferring to a University to study Gerontology and, if accepted into the program, will also continue her studies in Nursing. We need strong and committed women like Kailia working in Gerontology to improve the lives of the elderly!

As we end the Branch's *50th Anniversary Year*, the members, the community, and local businesses have propelled our philanthropy goals far beyond expectation. With this kind of support, our Branch is in a good position to continue our mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research.



We started off the year with the first of our two fundraisers, No Reservations, which produced contributions from approximately half of the Branch membership totaling almost **\$10,000**. Donations ranged from small to large and each added to our goal.

In March, we held the third Women of Distinction dinner and awards. This event has grown significantly since its implementation two years ago. With 7 business sponsors, 19 program advertisers, over 600 raffle tickets sold and 167 for dinner, the Women of Distinction dinner and awards was a huge success! It brought in over **\$18,000** dollars.

We have expanded our presence in the community by joining both Roseville and Rocklin Chambers of Commerce. This has led to greater visibility for AAUW as well as fostering area business contacts.

Due to your generosity and support, there is no doubt our community outreach programs, Tech Trek scholarships for graduating high school seniors, Sierra College scholarships for re-entry women, Sierra College leadership programs, Speech Trek, and local community programs on current issues and open to the public, will continue to grow and prosper next year.

Shop and place your order in the usual way, and Amazon takes care of the rest, giving back one-half a percent to our branch--not a lot, but every few dollars help, and you have no extra charges. You already have your credit card and personal information on file and secured with them, so you are not exposing any information to a third party. If you are an Amazon Prime user, the process works the same way.



If you are not an Amazon user but would like to be, you will be asked to set up an account. Amazon walks you through the process. If you are a regular Amazon buyer, you already know the procedures. April 11th Board Meeting Highlights

Finance reviewed plans for the 2018 – 2019 budget process.

Programs updated the plans for the final two Programs for the 2017–2018 year:

The Annual Meeting and the Installation Luncheon for the 2018–2019 AAUW Roseville-South Placer Branch Board.

Membership reported that to date in 2018 we have 7 new members and that Janet Dixon is now the Membership Treasurer.

Outreach updated the status of programs:

- There were 6 finalists for Sierra College Scholarships and 3 were selected.
- 7 recipients have been selected to receive High School Scholarships.
- 20 girls from 12 local schools applied for Tech Trek and 7 were selected.

Changes—and Time to Renew AAUW Membership

As we prepare for fiscal year 2019, there are a lot of changes happening at AAUW.



The AAUW Board of Directors voted in June 2017 to enact the first dues change in almost a decade. Effective March 16, 2018, **national dues will increase from \$49 to \$59.**

Annual dues currently account for 13 percent of AAUW's annual budget. They help to sustain and grow AAUW's programs and work that advances equity for women and girls. A combination of dues, donations, and corporate and foundation funding is critical to supporting AAUW's salary negotiation workshops, groundbreaking research, advocacy efforts, campus leadership programs, and so much more.

State and local dues stay the same: \$20 for State and \$24 for our local Branch. A total of \$103 for the coming 2018-2019 year.

AAUW is aiming high in the strategic planning process on which it has just embarked, undertaking an ambitious, rigorous course of action that will sharpen our focus, relevance, and impact and buttress our core issues — pay equity, education, STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math), leadership, and Title IX — to solidify AAUW's position as a leader within the equity space during the 21st century.

The process involves asking these questions: Where are we now? Where do we want to be? How will we get there? And it involves integrating our mission, programs, and business model. "We're going to need rigorous focus and meaningful relevance in order to achieve lasting impact with respect to our mission," says Churches (Chief executive officer Kimberly Churches). "We're about advancing equity, but what are we doing to ensure that we are demonstrating measurable impact? This is a new planning process, but it's more than a plan. It's about the outcomes we will achieve and how we implement them."

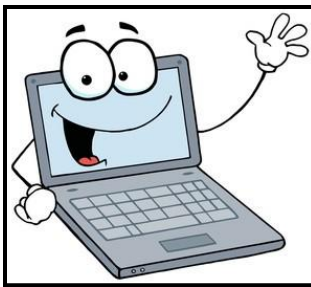
