Twentieth Year of Tech Trek Camp Invigorating, Enlightening and Fun By Kim Lillard, Tech Trek Chair

On Thursday, July 26th, several AAUW RSP members made the trip over to UC Davis to visit the young women whom our branch sent to this twentieth year of Tech Trek Camp. The visitors from our branch, including Dianne Black, Kathleen Crawford, Denise Hexom, Patti Kingston, Kim Lillard and Carol Mahany, were greeted by Camp Directors Martha Rees and Susan Wheeler and several other volunteers including dorm moms, assistant coordinators and youth counselors.

Camp dorm moms were assigned to take groups of visitors to each of the core classes at Thompson Hall, in which all the Trekkers participated every morning of camp. The visitors made the rounds of Engineering, 3D Math, Genetics, Anatomy, and Coding to see what the girls were learning from their choice of core classes. Trekkers were racing solar-powered cars in Engineering, testing the strengths of bridges and planning three-dimensional room designs in 3D Math, recording and comparing sheep's eyeball characteristics in Genetics, building a working model of a lung in Anatomy, and creating new computer games in Coding.

Visitation Day concluded the morning with a tour of the girls' dorm rooms, and a question-and-answer session held by the camp directors in the shady courtyard in front of Thompson Hall. Camp Director Martha Rees noted that this year's camp celebrating twenty years of Tech Trek had been "invigorating, enlightening and fun." Although visitors were welcome to join the Teck Trek girls at lunch in Segundo Hall and the afternoon classes across the campus at the Robert Mondavi Performing Arts Center, our group (like most visitors) chose to reconvene at a nearby restaurant to talk about the wonderful things we had seen during our tour.

Visitation Day is a highly anticipated and much-loved event each year at Tech Trek Camp. I encourage you to make the trip next year to see our girls involved in these fun and educational classes, group sessions, and life lessons. You will come away with great memories and a deeper understanding of, and appreciation for, the power of STEM concepts to change girls' lives.

Mark your calendars for Saturday, November 3rd, and keep watching future Branch Lines for a chance to attend an in-depth look at our Tech Trek scholars and the activities they engage in throughout the Tech Trek Camp week. If you have donated your time or funds to Tech Trek in the past, or if you would like to volunteer to be a more active participant in our STEM programs, you won't want to miss this coming event.

Find the "Select a charity" space and type in AAUW Roseville South Placer.

Then click the select button. Now you are on Amazon Smile. You have just entered Amazon through a different portal. Shop and place your order in the usual way, and Amazon takes care of the rest, giving back one-half a percent to our branch--not a lot, but every few dollars help, and you have no extra charges. You already have your credit card and personal information on file and secured with them, so you are not exposing any information to a third party. If you are an Amazon Prime user, the process works the same way.

If you are not an Amazon user but would like to be, you will be asked to set up an account. Amazon walks you through the process. If you are a regular Amazon buyer, you already know the procedures. Eventually, the branch hopes to have a similar connection with other businesses that will work the same way. Keep shopping and help our worthy causes!

When Women Vote, We Change the Conversation!

Since 1881, AAUW has been the leading voice promoting education and equity for women and girls.

AAUW encourages women voters to get involved in the political process and gain a better understanding of the impact that legislative action – or lack thereof – can have on our lives. In the current partisan climate, we as members need to be aware of what's at stake in both our national and state upcoming elections. Congressional races are particularly important this November.

Over the next two months we will be bombarded with political advertising in the media and in our mailboxes. There will be information from candidates for office and from proponents and opponents of ballot initiatives. As you sort through all this, please reflect on priority issues affecting us, our daughters and granddaughters, and evaluate candidates' positions on these issues. And for incumbent candidates, find out how they have voted, particularly on issues affecting women and girls.

State and County Voter guides - mailed to all registered voters in October.

If you have signed up to vote by mail, start your research soon, as your ballot will arrive in mid-October. And if you have recently moved, you need to update your information with the Placer County Registrar of Voters! Register to vote, if you haven't already.
